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Curriculum for the Master's Programme Linguistics

at the Faculty of Language, Literature and Culture of the University of Innsbruck

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§1 Allocation of the study programme

According to §54 par. 1 of the Universities' Act 2002, the Master's Programme Linguistics is allocated to the group of language, literature and culture studies.

§ 2 Qualification profile

- (1) The Master's Programme Linguistics is based on the skills acquired during the Bachelor's programme. It deepens and complements a scientifically oriented vocational education. Selected topics and research areas introduce the students to the current state of the discipline, whereby theory and empiricism as well as synchronous and diachronic approaches are closely related. The Master's Programme in Linguistics imparts highly specialised knowledge that partly links to the latest findings in a field of work or study, as basis for innovative approaches towards thinking and/or research.
- (2) Graduates of the Master's Programme Linguistics are capable beyond the scope of the Bachelor's Programme – to carry out theoretically founded analyses of linguistic facts and evaluating theoretical modelling in a synchronous and diachronic perspective.
 - 1. Subject-specific theoretical competences: By dealing with the cognitive and evolutionary fundamentals of language, its grammatical and logical structure as well as its social embedding, the students are enabled to carry out scientific studies independently. Through independent acquisition and critical reflection of new information and findings, they are able to contribute to innovation in their field of work or study.
 - 2. Practical language skills: During the Master's programme, the students' foreign language skills are broadened and consolidated mainly from a diachronic and typological perspective.
 - 3. Competences in cultural studies and media: The field of applied linguistics deepens the understanding of the interaction between language, media and culture through media-practical or application-oriented courses.
 - 4. Key qualifications: Besides of subject-specific scientific qualifications, also qualifications such as analytical thought, mental flexibility, good time management, fast and independent familiarisation with new fields of work, social skills and others are acquired during the study programme at or outside of university. Graduates have a critical awareness for questions of science in a field and at the intersection between to different other areas.
- (3) Fields of occupation: Possible fields of occupation include teaching and research at universities and non-university institutions. Other fields of activity are language consulting and communications training, language and communications technology as well as the media sector, the field of language standardisation and planning as well as in public administration or diplomatic service. Graduates of the Master's Programme in Linguistic can use their expertise in their working or study areas as well as knowledge from other disciplines for strategically directing complex projects, functional areas or companies.
- (4) A successfully completed Master's Programme Linguistics is the basis for a Doctoral Programme.

§ 3 Scope and duration

The Master's Programme Linguistics covers 120 ECTS-Credits. This corresponds to a study duration of four semesters. One ECTS-Credit corresponds to a workload of 25 hours.

§4 Admission

- (1) Admission to the Master's Programme Linguistics requires the completion of a subject-specific Bachelor's Programme or a subject-specific Bachelor's Programme at a University of Applied Sciences or another comparable study programme at an approved post-secondary educational institution home or abroad.
- (2) In any case, the Bachelor's Programme Linguistics at the University of Innsbruck is considered a relevant study programme. The rectorate decides, according to the Universities' Act, on study programmes in question or on the equivalence of a study programme passed at a post-secondary educational institution home or abroad for the admission to the Master's programme.
- (3) In the event that equivalence has been established in principle but with certain qualifications missing for full equivalence, supplemental examinations may be required by the rectorate. These examinations must be passed during the respective master's programme.

§ 5 Types of courses and maximum number of participants

(1) Courses without continuous performance assessment:

Lectures (VO) are courses held in lecture format. They introduce the research areas, methods and schools of thought for a given subject.

- (2) Courses with continuous performance assessment:
 - 1. **Seminars** (SE) provide in-depth treatment of scientific topics through students' presentations and discussion thereof. Maximum number of participants: 30
 - 2. **Practical courses** (UE) focus on the practical treatment of concrete scientific tasks within an area. Maximum number of participants: 25
 - 3. Lectures with practical elements (VU) focus on the practical treatment of concrete scientific tasks that are discussed during the lecture parts of the course. Maximum number of participants: 30

§ 6 Allocation of places in courses with a limited number of participants

In courses with a limited number of participants, course places are allocated as follows:

- 1. Students for whom the study duration would be extended due to the postponement are to be given priority.
- 2. If criterion no. 1 does not suffice for regulating the admission, then first, students of the Master's Programme in Linguistics, for whom the course is part of a compulsory module are to be given priority and second, students for whom the course is part of an elective module.

11. Individual Choice of Specialisation (maximum of 20 ECTS-Credits):

For individual specialisation modules corresponding to a maximum of 20 ECTS-Credits can be freely chosen from the Master's Programmes offered at the University of Innsbruck. The prerequisites specified in the respective curricula must be met.

§ 8 Master's Thesis

- (1) In the Master's Programme in Media a **Master's Thesis** amounting to **27.5 ECTS-Credits** must be written. The Master's Thesis is a scientific piece of work that proves the ability to work on a scientific topic independently and in a justifiable way in terms of content and methodology.
- (2) The topic for the Master's Thesis must be taken from compulsory modules 1 to 5, 8 and 9 or one of the selected elective modules 1 to 9. The topic must have a strong linguistic relevance.
- (3) Students have the right to suggest the topic for their Master's Thesis or to select from a number of suggestions.
- (4) Students have the right to write their Master's Thesis in a foreign language if the supervisor agrees to it.

§ 9 Examination regulations

- (1) Courses of modules are evaluated by course examinations. Course examinations are
 - 1. examinations that assess the knowledge and skills covered in the lectures in which course assessment is based on a single examination at the end of the course. The course instructor has to define and communicate the method of examination (written or oral) before the course begins.
 - 2. Courses with continuous assessment, for which course assessment is based on regular written and/or oral contributions by participants.
- (2) The course instructor has to inform the students on the objectives, contents and methods, as well as the contents, methods and evaluation criteria of the course examinations in a suitable manner before the start of the course.
- (3) The compulsory module "Master's Thesis Defense" is evaluated by an oral examination before an examination board. The examination board consists of three persons.

§10 Academic Degree

The graduates of the Master's Programme Linguistics are awarded the academic degree of "Master of Arts", abbreviated "MA".

§11 Coming into force

- (1) This curriculum comes into force on 1 October 2010.
- (2) The changes to the curriculum in the version of the University of Innsbruck Bulletin of 25 April 2018, Issue 28, No. 321 come into effect as of 1 October 2018 and are to be applied to all students.
